An explanation of an issue invites people to understand how something works: it doesn't just say there is a cause and effect, it shows how one leads to the other. Explanation moves beyond persuasion and empowers people in their own advocacy on a topic.

WHY IT MATTERS

When we leave out this step, people fall back on a shallow thought process that often leads to blaming more familiar causes like personal effort and individual choice, rather than going deeper to consider systemic injustices and adversities.



These shallower understandings then shape a (misinformed) perception of appropriate responses.

Put simply, many advocacy narratives are missing an ingredient whose absence undermines understanding and derails public engagement. This often-elusive ingredient is explanation.

TECHNIQUES WE CAN USE

In narratives, we can effectively tuck an explanation in between the "why" of the orienting values and the "what" of our proposed solutions, as the "how" that links them.

Explanatory chains offer linear paths connecting A to B to C. Explanatory examples give concrete illustrations that are easy to remember. Explanatory metaphors are also memorable, using familiar experiences to help understand an unfamiliar one. All 3 can be used to explain root causes.
